Zaiya: Why did you volunteer to become an academic mentor for the Radnor ABC Program?

Stacy: I've had several wonderful mentors and cheerleaders throughout my life. My parents, grandparents, certain teachers, and employers all helped to guide me. Z: What advice would you give to Radnor ABC scholars?

S: Never give up, never underestimate yourself, and don't be intimidated by anyone. Surround yourself with positive people. Challenge yourself, network, be kind, be flexible & enjoy the ride.

Z: What was a challenge that you had to overcome in your academic or professional career?

S: In high school, I had a very strict French teacher. She did not allow anyone to speak English in her classroom. Although I had a B average, she gave me a D because I spoke English to my friends several times. I pulled my grade back up and sophomore year, I switched to Spanish.

Z: Where did you attend college and what did you study?

S: I went to the University of Michigan, majored in History and minored in Communications. I studied abroad in London one semester of my junior year and traveled all around Europe.

Z: Tell us about your career path...

S: It's a nonlinear career path for sure. My senior year of college, I applied for positions in TV production. When I barely received a response, I decided to apply to grad school for journalism. I was accepted by NYU and planned to start a semester late. In the meantime, I found a few temp jobs in Philly. I learned that NBC had a temp position open and I jumped at it. As soon as I got my foot in the door at NBC, I told my supervisor that I wanted to be a writer. She believed in me, trained me, and hired me full-time as a writer/producer. I was 22 years old. I ended up working for NBC and CBS for five years (and never going to grad school). When the news became endlessly depressing after 9/11, my mom asked if I'd ever considered law school. On a whim, I took the LSAT and applied to Temple Law School. I was accepted. I quit my TV job and went to law school. During and afterwards, I worked for two law firms, specializing in commercial litigation and civil rights. After my sons were born, I took several years off to be home with them. I wrote and published personal essays and started a blog. Most recently, my sister and I started our own law practice. We support children with special needs in education. We are also working on a children's book about law. My career path is proof that persistence pays off and that it's possible to pursue different passions.
